BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

Alberta Health Services EMS would like to remind parents and students about some basic road safety tips, as streets become more congested, with the return of the school year. Pedestrians

Motorists

- Avoid talking on cell phones, texting, or any other behavior that diverts your attention away from driving.
- Give right of way to pedestrians who have activated overhead crossing lights, or who are waiting to cross from a street corner.
- Remember, it is illegal to pass vehicles other than those that are parked in school zones or playground zones, during posted hours.

And motorists both have an important role to play – road safety is a shared responsibility.

Around school buses

- Flashing amber lights mean a bus is slowing down to stop. Motorists should do likewise.
- No matter which direction you are coming from, STOP, when approaching a school bus with activated flashing red lights unless the bus is on the opposite side of a divided highway from you.
- Driver courtesy goes a long way. By simply being alert and cautious when approaching a school bus, you are contributing to school bus safety.

Pedestrians

- Cross only at marked crosswalks, or street corners that have clear visibility from all directions.
- Make eye contact with all drivers before crossing the street.
- When activating overhead crossing lights, pause before stepping off the curb to ensure motorists in both directions have come to a complete stop.
- Stay within the crosswalk lines until fully clear of the roadway.
- Obey pedestrian lights at intersections. Cross the street only when you see the 'walk' sign and only when all cars have come to a complete stop.
- If you are with young children or pets, hold your child's hand firmly and keep a solid grip on leashes when crossing.
- Remember: children learn by observing. By demonstrating safe crossing habits, you can reduce the chances of your child being involved in a preventable auto/pedestrian collision.

Ensuring the safety of people and pets

Responsibilities of dog owners in off-leash areas:

Dogs are allowed to be off-leash only in designated off-leash areas. Even in off-leash areas, dogs must be on leash in the parking lot and on the pathways. All of Calgary's pathways are on leash areas.

In an off-leash area, owners must ensure that their dog is under control at all times. Under control means that the dog must remain at such a distance from his owner so as to respond to voice, sound or sight commands. It also means that the dog must not chase, threaten or attack people or animals.

Responsibilities of dog owners on pathways:

- Owners must have their dog secured by a leash no longer than two metres.
- Owners must ensure that their dog remains on the righthand side of the pathway unless moving around other users.
- Owners must ensure that their dog remains under control at all times and does not interfere with other users.
- Owners must not be on a bicycle, skateboard or rollerblades with any animal on a leash.
- Responsibilities of dog owners in other public spaces:
- Owners must not leave their dog unattended while tethered or tied on premises accessible to the public.

Responsibilities of dog owners on private properties:

• Owners must ensure that their dog is not left unsupervised while tethered or tied on a private property.

COMMUNITY business of the month **The Yoga Shala** Hounsfield Heights - Briar Hill Community

n 2003, the Yoga Shala Calgary opened its doors as the city's first traditional Ashtanga Yoga studio. In those days, yoga was not nearly as popular as it is now. The studio quickly became known for offering high quality yoga instruction and a sense of community to its participants. Many of the current students have been attending since its inception, and most of the teachers started at the Shala as students.

Dana Blonde, a native Calgarian, was one of the first instructors at the Yoga Shala (then owned by her friend and fellow yogi, Melody). Upon hearing the studio was up for sale in 2008 Dana knew it was her destiny to return to Calgary from BC, where she was living with her husband Brent. In April 2008, Dana and Brent stepped in as the Shala's new owners, and are an essential part of the studio's day-to-day activity. Also a busy Calgary realtor, Brent is invested in his community and the area of Briar Hill in particular.

To this day, the studio thrives by teaching traditional Ashtanga Yoga, in the lineage of Sri K Pattabhi Jois of Mysore, India. From Monday to Friday students attend as early as 5:00 a.m. to partake in the popular "Mysore Style" practice, which is the 2nd largest program of its kind in Canada. Between the hours of 5:00 - 8:30 a.m. every day, students of all shapes and sizes do a self-led practice with guidance and one-on-one instruction from a teacher. The hustle of many bodies coming and going at different times along with the sound of deep rhythmic breathing is a sight to be seen!

Each day the Shala offers a wide variety of classes such as flow, restorative, yoga nidra, kids yoga, prenatal, mom & baby and more. The studio runs a successful Yoga Therapy program, which brings together elements of yoga and kinesiology to create ease of movement in the joints and true core strength. They also offer a weekly donation-based community class, from which all monies go to local and international causes.

Classes at the Shala are filled with people of all ages, levels and abilities. Staff and teachers are hired based on their friendly, warm and compassionate personalities, with the intention that the studio be a safe haven from the sometimes frenetic pace of city life. With an atmosphere surrounded by warm dark wood and Indian tapestries, stepping into the Yoga Shala is like stepping into a little piece of India, the birthplace of yoga. It is definitely a beacon of peace in the centre of this big city, and a place to feel supported in one's efforts to let go, re-prioritize, and make the most of life by increasing health and vitality.

For those not sure which class might be appropriate to start with, The Shala has a "Yoga Advisor" to help beginner students determine which classes will suit their needs. Feel free to call or drop by sometime if you're curious!

I would like to thank the many community volunteers who have worked so hard to make all these events so successful. I have also been proactively engaged with local community groups and associations, students, seniors and many stakeholder groups in the riding with visits, meetings and roundtables. In November, Council will set Calgary's direction for the next four years by reviewing the City's business plan and budget. Action Plan 2015-2018 builds on five priority themes identified by Calgarians: a prosperous city, a city of inspiring neighbourhoods, a city that moves, a healthy and green city, and a well-run city.

While these priorities may seem basic, they are pillars that guide all departments in service delivery and planning for the next generation. Most interesting is the community feedback with each of these pillars and the differences between Wards. Getting around Calgary was the highest priority for all Calgarians, and while this includes all modes of transportation, Ward 7 residents ranked accessible public transit, and pedestrian and cycling infrastructure higher than other wards. That's not surprising considering the 2013 census results show Ward 7 and Ward 8 with the lowest share of single-occupancy-vehicle commuters in Calgary. Popular alternatives in Ward 7 show growing numbers who carpool (3%), take transit (23%), walk (14%), or cycle (5%) to work.

Ward 7 residents also think globally, choosing affordable housing options and responsible use of energy as important themes. Local festivals and culture rank higher with Ward 7 residents compared to crime prevention, fire protection, and safety education. While safety is important, Ward 7 residents also recognize that cultural activities make communities safer and more vibrant.

When we talk about a growing city, Ward 7 residents put emphasis on local parks, reinvesting in older communities, and development near C-Train stations, all reflective of mature communities undergoing rejuvenation.

Interestingly, Ward 7 residents ranked Calgary's environment higher than Calgary's economy, which was the reverse citywide. We recognize that Calgary cannot be prosperous in the longterm without environmental success. With several Ward 7 communities impacted by the 2013 floods, it is also no surprise that flood and watershed management ranked highly.
