What's wrong with this Christmas picture?

Many of us have an ideal picture in our head of the perfect glowing Christmas tree in front of the hearth with flowers and candles throughout the room and the adorable blond cocker spaniel puppy sitting in front of the tree, ribbon in his mouth and his present between his paws. Look at the picture and see the dangers our pets face at Christmas.

At Christmas, veterinarians see a huge increase in dogs suffering from what we call "Garbage Gut Gastritis". Gastro-intestinal upsets ranging from mild to potentially life-threatening and can ruin Christmas... so practice restraint. Cooked turkey bones splinter and ham is far too rich for most pets to tolerate. Bowls of treats left out on coffee tables beg to be eaten. Chocolates, nuts, candy canes, and shortbread...Yum! Well if the goodies can be sniffed out in wrapped box under the tree at floor level, even a well-behaved pet may believe...it's mine. Remember chocolate, especially dark chocolate, is toxic to dogs and can cause heart problems.

Mistletoe, holly, lilies, and poinsettias are all toxic to varying degrees to pets and children. The toxic element of poinsettias has been reduced by growers and now usually causes only mild enteritis.

Ribbon, twine, and tinsel fall under the veterinary category of "linear or string foreign object" if ingested by a pet. They are doubly dangerous because the sharp edges of ribbon and tinsel can cut the lining of the gut. The free ends move down the intestine and act like knives as the normal waves of motion pass through the guts. Diagnosis of the problem can be difficult because there is no complete blockage and the ribbon does not show up on radiographs or x-rays. Decorations with wires in the middle and popcorn or candy on the outside go down the gullet easily, but don't pass through so well. What veterinarians have seen animals eat or swallow whole over the years is usually limited only by your imagination! Some veterinary journals have competitions inviting vets to share our most impressive radiographs of the things our patients eat!

Flickering candles, tree ornaments and all the electrical wires necessary to light our homes are as attractive to a pet as they are to a young child. All those bright ornaments can shatter and lacerate your pet's paws or mouth. Pawing at the flickering light of a candle or chewing a wire may cause a fire in your home. If you have a pet... stand back and look at your house with the same mindset to safety as if you were protecting an infant or young toddler from their dangerous curiosity.

With additional socializing inherent to the holiday season, make sure your pet is wearing identification in the event they slip out the door. If parties are not to your pet's taste, confinement in a quiet isolated part of the house is preferable. Between the lights and the excitement, I find many of my epileptic patients have more seizures and many of my fragile elderly patients are more likely to become stressed and ill.

Finally, making a pet a part of your family should never be an impulse purchase. This is why many humane societies halt adoptions at Christmas time. Make sure you take a little time to think through if you have the space, time, and financia I resources to support a pet. Don't buy or give a pet on a whim caught up in the fever of gift giving.

Christmas morning many furry children have their own gifts under the tree (mine do). Select a pet's gifts with the same attention to safety you would give a gift selected for a toddler. Have a very merry (healthy and safe) Christmas.

The Christmas season is prime time for car prowlers and thieves. Gifts and valuables left in vehicles can make their jobs easy. Here are a few tips to help reduce your risk:

- When you exit or enter your parked vehicle, stop and take a look around the area
- Before leaving your parked car, always lock the doors
- Park in a well-lit area, use parking lots frequented by others
- Put all valuables and gifts in your trunk. If that's not possible, conceal gifts and other valuables
- Try not to unload gifts in your vehicle and then leave it unattended in the same parking spot. Car prowlers might be on the lookout forshoppers traveling back and forth from stores to unload gifts.
- Never leave your car running unattended
- If you park in an attached garage, always lock the door leading from the house to the garage and the garage door
- After opening an automatic gate to underground parking, wait for the gate to close before you park

Prevent crime by reporting suspicious behaviour to police at (403) 266-1234, and always call 911 for a crime in progress.

If your car is broken into:

- Inventory missing articles for later use with the police or an insurance claim.
- Report online at www.calgarypolice.ca/onlinreporting or in person at a district office. Even if there's little chance of catching the suspect, alerting the police can help prevent somebody else's car from being prowled.

Be a good neighbour, clear the snow

Winter has arrived and it's time to be mindful of how the buildup of ice and snow on city sidewalks can post a risk of injury to Calgarians. Older adults, those with mobility issues or parents pushing strollers or walking with young children, may find it treacherous to venture out if neighbours are not diligent about clearing the ice and snow. All of us can help make walking in our communities safe for everyone if we work together and follow the regulations set out in Calgary's Street Bylaw.

Property owners are responsible for clearing all sidewalks adjacent to their property. This means removing all snow and ice down to the bare concrete within 24 hours after the snow stops falling. If, as a property owner, you do not live at the residence, it is important to work with tenants or arrange for a contractor to clear the snow. It's also important to note that if a property is being developed, the developer is often the owner responsible to clean sidewalks around a construction site or empty lot. The property owner is ultimately responsible for snow clearing under the bylaw. For any ice that is difficult to remove, a de-icing mixture is available at fire halls or Roads depots. Please bring your own container.

Remember that snow from private property cannot be put onto the road or boulevard. Large mounds of snow in the street can impede the flow of traffic, limit driver and pedestrian visibility and hinder Blue Cart and Black Bin collection.

Sidewalks also need to be clear of obstructions such as electrical cords. When plugging in your vehicle, make sure you don't place an electrical cord on or over any portion of a street.

Have you considered being a Snow Angel? It can be a challenge for some residents to shovel and clear their sidewalks. The Snow Angel campaign encourages citizens to be good neighbours by helping older adults and others in need with their snow removal. All you have to do is adopt someone's sidewalk this winter and keep it clear.

Let's remember that snow, ice and obstructions on our sidewalks can result in serious injuries and can cause those with limited mobility to be confined indoors. Be a good neighbour and clear the snow.

Merry Christmas and Happy Holidays from Councillor Druh Farrell

In November's newsletter, I introduced the City of Calgary's biggest priority: responding to the needs of a growing population. The City Manager since advised City Council that rapid growth is not just a planning issue, it is a financial issue, and in order to protect the fiscal health of our City, we must change the current system.

It is projected that Calgary will grow by up to 40,000 people a year for the next four years. Each new Calgarian requires a \$17,000 investment in utilities, roads, transit, and other infrastructure (at this growth rate, we will need to expand wastewater treatment plant capacity every six years). While we welcome new residents to help Calgary to grow, our ability to accommodate them is becoming increasingly strained under the existing model.

After advising Council on the financial magnitude of the growth challenges and the impacts on both our capital and operating budgets, our Chief Financial Officer provided potential solutions.

The City requires changes to Provincial legislation in order to explore different revenue sources including developer-paid infrastructure. Necessary changes are included in our negotiations with the Province on the creation of a City Charter which are currently underway.

While the strategic use of debt continues to be an option, I remain strongly opposed to increasing our debt limits as Calgary's debt-per-capita ratio is the highest of all major cities in Canada. Incurring more debt for depreciating capital infrastructure simply offloads the burden to future generations.

The City and the development industry (who acknowledge that change is needed) have agreed to work together on a new funding model in response to growth challenges. The objective is to ensure a sustainable funding agreement, with full cost recovery for The City and taxpayers, while allowing the development industry to remain profitable. A coordinated approach to planning and investment will allow The City to scale its efforts regardless of population growth.
