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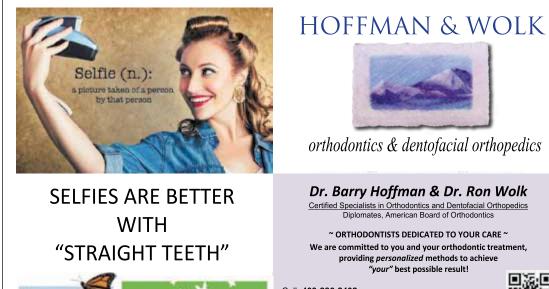

in & around your community **Schools** Hounsfield Heights - Briar Hill Community Kindergarten

The Hounsfield Heights - Briar Hill Community Kindergarten is an ancillary group of the Hounsfield Heights - Briar Hill Community Association. It operates as a private, non-profit Kindergarten program and has been part of our community since the 1960's. Since 1972 it has operated in the Briar Hill School at 1233-21 Street N.W. It shares the west wing of the school with two Grade 1 classes, the Briar Hill Children's Programs (which includes an out-of-school care program and a daycare) and the HH-BH Playschool.

The program has access to the Briar Hill School library, the school gymnasium and its equipment, the playground and community park across the street. We utilize community resources available to us, both professional (public health nurses, police, firemen etc.) and non-professional (parents or staff with special skills or interests). Physical resources in the community consistent with our program's goals are also utilized, such as the local fire station and library.

The Kindergarten is licensed, approved and subsidized by the Alberta Ministry of Education. Government funding is received directly by the Kindergarten and the disbursement of all funds is managed by the Local Advisory Committee (LAC), the decision-making body within the Kindergarten.

We differ from the Calgary Board of Education Kindergarten programs in that we rely on parent volunteers to administer the program along with a paid Teacher. This gives us local autonomy in many areas such as hiring staff, determining class size, fee structure and field trip experiences. The biggest advantage to our program is that once the minimum program standards of Alberta Education have been met, we can provide program enhancement. Each year we offer swimming lessons and at least four unique field trips to destinations such as the Spaceport, Glenbow Museum and Dinosaur Park. Along with this flexibility and control comes responsibility and commitment to maintain the program at the standards outlined by Alberta Education.

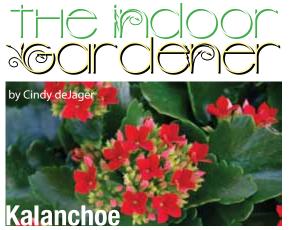

Kalanchoe (kal-un-KOH-ee) is a genus of about 125 species of tropical, succulent flowering plants in the family Crassulaceae, mainly native to the Old World.

K. blossfeldiana: Is the most popular Kalanchoe, with large flower heads in a variety of colors.

Kalanchoes are native to arid areas, and they are popular succulents, available in red, pink, yellow, or white.

They grow best in bright, sunny locations, especially in the summer growing season. They prefer warmth. Do not let fall below 55°F. Water moderately throughout the summer and reduce watering in the winter.

Kalanchoe plants do best in a well-draining potting mix designed for cacti and succulents, or stir in plenty of perlite or sand to improve drainage.

Kalanchoes are easy to propagate by stem or leaf cuttings. Some varieties will put out plantlets that can be removed and potted.

It is not necessary to discard the plants after the bloom is over. Simply cut off the flowering head, let the plant rest with reduced water, and resume its normal care. It should flower naturally in spring. You can force your plant to bloom – here's how:

• Kalanchoes bloom in response to the length of day. To force your plant to set flower buds requires six weeks of simulated winter lighting conditions.

Water half as often, or even less, during the six weeks.
For six weeks, put your plant in complete darkness for 14 hours a day, and in bright light for 10 hours a day. After six weeks or so, when you see flower buds forming, you can bring your plant back out into normal light conditions and resume watering.

For Christmas Morning enjoy a Black Forest Ham Frittata with Gruyere, Kale and Roasted Red Peppers

Ingredients:

30 mL (2 tbsp) 60 mL (1/4cup)

500 mL (2cups) 250 mL (1cup)

onions, chopped fine garlic clove, finely minced kale, chopped coarsely eggs, beaten black forest ham diced 85 mL (1/3cup) roasted red peppers, cut into strips gruyere cheese, shredded 125 mL (1/2cup) chives, chopped finely 30 mL (2 tbsp) 5 mL (1/2 tsp) salt black pepper, ground 2 mL (1/2 tsp)

olive oil

Directions:

Preheat oven to 180 C (350 F). Add olive oil to a 25cm (10 inch) non-stick pan and cook onions until they are translucent. Add garlic and kale. Stir and cook kale until wilted (2 to 3 minutes).

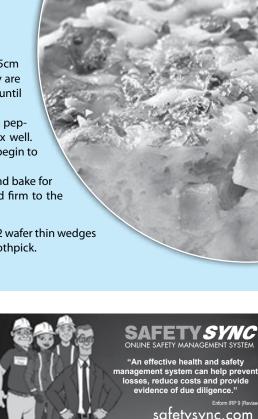
Beat eggs in a bowl and add the black forest ham, peppers, half the cheese, chives, salt and pepper. Mix well. Pour egg mix into the pan and stir mix until eggs begin to set. Cease stirring.

Top the frittata with the other half of the cheese and bake for 8 to 10 minutes until frittata is golden brown and firm to the touch. Cut into 6 wedges and serve hot.

For cold frittata, allow to cool before cutting into 12 wafer thin wedges or cut into 2.5 cm (1 inch) cubes and place on a toothpick.

Serves 6.

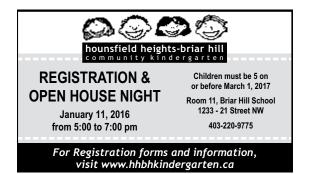

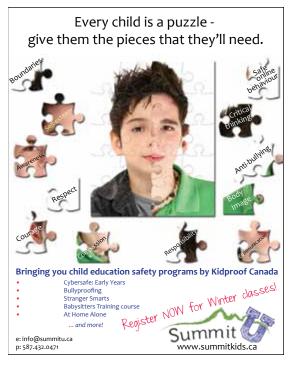
Join Calgary's largest snowball fight! You can sign up at snowfight.wix.com/signup to participate in our second annual snowball hygge.

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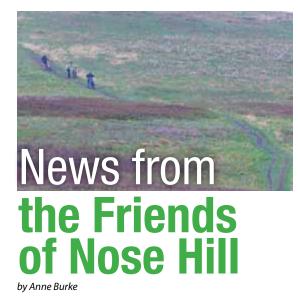
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We have received feedback on the number of trail closures on Nose Hill, especially disappointment that the closures are useless because people will simply go around them. At least there is some public awareness about the designated trail and pathway network to orient users while in the park. There is still the need for user education on the rationale behind the loss of trails and the long-term goals for reclamation.

The Nose Hill Natural Environment Management Plan provides for Calgary Parks Department to reclaim many of the previously disturbed areas in the park, as well as many of the park's informal routes. Attempts were made to close these routes and rehabilitate the surface, stabilize soil and bring the site back to a natural vegetated state.

However, success depends on not only closing trails but redirecting use to appropriate areas, in addition to educating users on park use and management goals.

The Nose Hill Trail and Pathway Plan called for a comprehensive and integrated approach to park and pathway planning in order to more effectively deal with trail closures:

a designated trail and pathway system for the entire park
well-marked and formally constructed trails and pathways
a restoration strategy for closed informal trails

• designation of appropriate trails and pathways for all uses

The plan is to close and rehabilitate all informal routes not in the designated routing system. Informal routes were closed and identified by the use of appropriate obstacles and appropriate signage. Designated routes are defined through surfacing, trail markers, and orientation signs. The hope is reclamation of undesignated trails will provide great improvement to the ecological integrity of the park by decreasing vegetation losses, habitat fragmentation, and soil compaction.

Nose Hill Park is a major regional park serving all Calgarians. It represents a significant part of our region's history, Aboriginal heritage and use in the Calgary region; it will benefit greatly from the preservation and trail management initiatives funded through Canada's 150 Community Infrastructure Program. This involves construction and restoration of new and existing trails, installation of timber landscape stairs, and trail markers.

As Nose Hill is one of the largest contiguous natural environment parks in a major city, this will create a lasting legacy as Canada prepares to celebrate the 150th anniversary of Confederation in 2017.
