



## Skating on the Outdoor Rinks! Thank you Volunteers!

For a few decades; the rink has been a central feature to the community during the winter and on the weekends can see up to 100 visitors who enjoy the tranquility of this exceptional outdoor community rink. In November the boards are brought out of storage and assembled by a group of about 12 volunteers. After much ground snow clearing, flooding and smoothing; the ice is usually good enough to skate on in late November and is maintained by many enthusiastic volunteers as long as weather permits (around March). The boards come down before spring soccer starts in April and are stored again until the fall.

This year Porta-Ice has been contracted to keep the ice surface smooth and maintained so the ice is in great condition! Additionally the community association has invested \$1,400 in the purchase of a snow blower. After a heavy snowfall it can take a few volunteers several hours to clear off snow and the snow blower has been a huge time saver to allow one person to do the work in about half the time (and far less physical exhaustion).



One of the volunteers, Lucas, who has taken up a lot of the "care taking" for the ice mentioned this: "I am grateful for the many anonymous helpers who grab a shovel and help keep the surface in good shape. When I was a kid in the neighbourhood, I took full advantage of the rink, not thinking much about how it was there or the work that was needed to keep it going. I now love helping out as a way to give gratitude to the countless helpers over the years whose efforts allowed me to enjoy this community treasure. And of course my kids love to skate out there and play; and me too!"

## SEARS PLUME UPDATE

#### Greetings,

Sears Canada Inc. (Sears) and Clifton Associates Ltd. (Clifton) are pleased to provide this quarterly update on the environmental assessment and remediation activities that are ongoing in the community of Hounsfield Heights – Briar Hill (the community). This work is related to soil and groundwater contamination which originated from an accidental leak of petroleum at the former gas station site on the Sears North Hill mall site. The petroleum storage tanks were removed from the gas station in 1995. Petroleum hydrocarbons and constituents associated with gas station operations migrated under the community.

As discussed in our previous updates, Sears, with the help of its consultant Clifton, has conducted additional detailed environmental site investigation in 2014 and 2015 in order to better understand the subsurface geology and where the contamination from the former gas station is located in the soil and groundwater. This included sampling from numerous locations on the Sears North Hill mall site and in the community. A report on this investigation will be submitted to Alberta Environment and Parks by January 2016 and will be made available to interested residents through the Hounsfield Heights Gas Plume Committee web site.

Information from the detailed environmental site investigation is being used for a number of purposes including:

- 1. reassessing the risks to human health and the environment;
- 2. identifying areas that need further investigation to fill in any data gaps; and,
- 3. developing and implementing additional remedial approaches to supplement the existing remediation system located to the north of the community in Lions Park.

A draft human health and ecological risk assessment was completed by Intrinsik Environmental Sciences Inc. and was submitted in December 2015 to Alberta Environment and Parks and Alberta Health Services for regulatory review. The review will take time because of the complexity, and once the risk assessment report is finalized it will be made available to the public through the Hounsfield Heights Gas Plume Committee web

## site and the Environmental Site Assessment Repository (ESAR) government web site.

Based on data collected to date, the risk assessment indicates that risks to human health are negligible. While the risk is considered fairly low over much of the community, there are some data gaps to fill near the southern edge of the plume; this area in particular will be targeted for work in 2016. Further data will be collected in 2016 and in subsequent years to check the conclusions to date, and accordingly any adjustments needed to the management plan will be made.

A key component to help verify the risk assessment is vapour sampling. Some of the contaminants in the soil and groundwater can be released as vapours, which can then migrate into buildings if the conditions are right. Limited vapour sampling occurred in the 2014/2015 investigation work, and a community wide soil-vapour monitoring program is planned to start 2016.

Clifton was recently in the community completing a door to door survey requesting that residents voluntarily participate in planned and future monitoring and remedial programs. This included asking for access to properties, and asking about the construction of homes. For those who have not yet confirmed their participation and would like to do so, please contact Stephen d'Abadie at Clifton using the contact information below.

In the coming year, you will see Clifton in the community conducting additional investigation drilling in some areas where more information needs to be gathered in addition to the ongoing, groundwater monitoring program.

Sears and Clifton are working on an expanded remediation plan for implementation in 2016, which will consist of the continued operation of the Dual Phase Vapor Extraction system located in Lion's Park, as well as other options which will be submitted to Alberta Environment and Parks. One of the proposed options is to inject materials into the subsurface which are designed to clean the contaminants as the groundwater passes through them. This should also provide a barrier to help prevent further hydrocarbon plume expansion in the community. Monitoring will be used to check the effectiveness of remedial actions.











We can preserve nature and foster biodiversity for future generations, by staying on designated pathways and trails in our parks, in addition to respecting wildlife habitat and their migration patterns. The long-range plans are to monitor and manage invasive species (weeds); reduce habitat fragmentation; and link important habitat areas in the city and region.

The city-wide Biodversity committee has met and a website with agenda and minutes is in the works. In the meantime, digital versions of the 10-year strategic plan can be found on the City's biodiversity page at: www. calgary.ca/biodiversity.

Many of Calgary's existing open space sites, such as Nose Hill, Union Cemetery, Reader Rock Garden, Riley Park, Fort Calgary, and Inglewood Bird Sanctuary are in the category of Cultural landscapes. A major challenge is



determining which method is most appropriate for the resource, with a view toward protection, preservation or conservation, and restoration.

Cultural resource projects may include some or all of the following:

- Protection: measures needed to guard against further damage or deterioration;
- Preservation: ongoing maintenance activities that preserve the historic appearance or features of the landscape;
- Restoration: the removal of later additions and the recreation of missing elements

Of the 800 kms of city-wide pathways, City Council approved snow clearing for up to 350 kms. Generally, City Parks crews are to clear snow on pathways within 24 hours and on sidewalks adjacent to parks within 72 hours. Re: concerns about pathways in natural parks not being cleared, some trails/pathways are best used only in non-winter months. Due to the steepness of the slope or site conditions, there may be safety concerns for potential pathway users and crews.

Environmentally Significant Areas (ESAs) are land with conservation value.

This applies to the river valley system, the urban forest, and natural environment parks. The land includes escarpments, natural grasslands, woodlots, and native pasture but also pertains to wetlands, natural bodies of water, and riparian corridors (along the river margins and banks).

There is an update on Open Space policy for recreational and environmental park spaces. Stakeholder consultation meetings with City Parks staff and industry began in February 2015. A final draft form of impact assessment for ESAs was debated by Council in early 2016. Planning and mapping guidelines are expected and a work program completed by March 2016.

The City's Roads department works hard to plow, salt and sand roadways on a seven day priority schedule. The Parks department quickly clears designated multi-use pathways within 24 hours. Teams often work overnight to keep the greatest number of Calgarians moving safely. Keeping our roads safe for everyone is also a joint effort between the City and Calgarians. When it snows, make sure to give yourself more time to reach your destination, and leave a greater distance between yourself and the vehicle ahead of you. Please also be extra mindful of people walking and cycling, who may struggle more in difficult conditions. Calgary.ca/snow is the onestop shop for winter travel tips, the road conditions map, frequently asked questions, updates, and more.

Sidewalks are the responsibilities of adjacent property owners and must be cleared within 24 hours. Unfortunately, not everyone is able to clear her or his sidewalk. Keeping sidewalks clear of snow and ice can be challenging or impossible for seniors and others with limited mobility. Please consider becoming a Snow Angel and helping those who are less able. All you need to do is adopt someone's sidewalk and clear it as you would your own. Watch for neighbours who could use help removing snow and lend them a hand. 

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




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
