Mail-in ballots for the 2017 **Election**

In October, Calgarians will vote to elect their Mayor, Councillors and School Board Trustees, Your community is shaped by the outcome of an Election. If you are unable to vote during the Advance Vote or on Election Day due to physical incapacity, being absent from the city, working as an election worker, or volunteering/working on a campaign, you can request a mail-in ballot online by visiting www.electionscalgary.ca, by phone, 403-476-4100 (option 2), in-person or in writing at the Elections & Census Office, 1103 - 55 Avenue NE.

If you request a mail-in ballot, a ballot package with instructions will be mailed to you after Nomination Day (September 18, 2017). A photocopy of an authorized piece of identification must be sent back with the returned ballots. Ballots must be received by the Elections & Census Office no later than 8 p.m. on Election Day (October 16, 2017). Our Summer Solstice and Stampede Breakfast are held at Green Park, located on the Briar Hill side of our community. This is a wonderful green space that is accessible to everyone and well used for many activities. But we also have another park that is often overlooked - Lions Park, located along the south side of 14th Ave and stretching between 14th and 19th Streets.

I'm sure that those of you who lived here before the LRT and its Lions Park Station were built have many fond memories of this hidden gem with its meandering trail, big trees, and water feature that included a stream and small pools. Unfortunately, this little park has lost some of its charm recently due to many undesirable activities by non-residents, including drug dealers and addicts who abuse its benches and quiet spaces. The water feature was shut down years ago and several benches have been removed. The playground still stands but parents and city police constables are ever vigilant for garbage and used needles.

Since that time, I have been trying to keep this ball rolling by learning about what resources are available to improve the park and by meeting with City of Calgary Parks representatives. For instance, there is a new Activate YYC program whose tagline is "Walk, Play and Be Neighbourly". Through it we may be able to obtain a grant to improve the walkability of the park. If you've attended a Hounsfield Heights-Briar Hill event in the past decade or more, chances are Carol Sandahl was involved in planning, organizing, and/or leading, which is why she was an obvious (and unanimous) choice for our first profile.

Carol and her husband of 30 years have been residents of HH-BH since 1994, moving into the neighbourhood when she was seven months pregnant. She has been



an active community volunteer since her two sons began attending the Briar Hill playschool, and continued her service as they transitioned through Briar Hill's kindergarten, afterschool programs, and elementary school. Now both sons have graduated from William Aberhart School; one is studying engineering at the University of Alberta and the other is awaiting final word on his school of choice. Carol has worked hard to ensure her children, along with everyone else's, were able to grow up in a safe, vibrant neighbourhood and were instilled with a strong sense of community service.

Currently, as vice-president of the community association and director of programs, Carol's most visible roles include organizing the annual Summer Solstice. Stampede Breakfast, and Casino events. This year she has taken on the additional tasks of leading the community centre expansion and the community 'rock' restoration projects (located on the SE corner of 19th Street and 14th Avenue).

What's not so visible though is Carol's relentless work behind the scenes as the community association historian (having spent over 12 years in various board roles) and go-to person for almost everything related to the HH-BH community work. Her deep involvement in everything from strategic planning to program development has had a significant impact in a number of areas, such as bringing in the soccer field and adult fitness park.

"It makes me so happy to see people enjoying the soccer field for more than just soccer – but also as a reflective space for reading or meditating, and as a family space for picnics and other outdoor activities," says Carol.



Update

City Council Approves Final Recommendations

Thank you once again for your participation and feedback throughout the study process.

On May 8, 2017, Council unanimously approved the recommended short-, medium- and long-term plans for Crowchild Trail.

What's next?

Funding for the short-term recommendations was approved by Council April 24, 2017. Construction is anticipated to start in fall 2017. More information is provided below.

The medium- and long-term plans are recommended to be implemented beyond 10 years. The plans are currently not funded within The City's Investing in Mobility Capital Plan. (http://www.calgary.ca/Transportation/TP/Pages/Planning/ Calgary-Transportation-Plan/Transportation-Infrastructure-Investment-Plan-(TIIP).aspx) This means we do not expect to acquire private properties, or begin design and construction of the medium-term plan for approximately 10 years. We will be connecting with property owners and businesses that are impacted by the medium-term plan over the next few weeks to provide an update and more information on the future property acquisition process.

Update on the Short-Term Plan

We are currently developing an implementation and construction plan for the projects listed in the short-term plan.

Construction is anticipated to begin in Fall 2017 and take approximately three years to complete. It will occur in several phases, likely beginning with work on the Bow River Bridge.

Traffic and pathway detours, as well as some temporary lane or road closures, are expected during the 2018 and 2019 construction seasons. These closures are necessary to complete the life cycle bridge rehabilitation and the bridge widening, as well as realign the existing ramps along Crowchild Trail.

There are no anticipated impacts to private properties in the short-term plan.


New pilot signage aims to hit the mark with Calgarians

Update on the Motel Village meeting June 14th, 2017

The meeting began with a presentation by developer Henry Morton, who advised that Campus Suites has built 14,000 beds to date across North America.

Campus Suites' plan for the Motel Village site is to build mixed use residential/retail/commercial. There would be a full-time property manager on site, as well as students who live on site and are employed to assist with the monitoring of the site. It will be a secure, controlled access building. In addition to Campus Suites, the current owner of the land (Royal Wayne) is involved in the development, as well as a REIT (real estate investment trust).

The 28-storey building would be located 100 feet from 16th Avenue with the main level used as restaurant/ retail, 2nd and 3rd levels medical/office, and the rest residential. Proposed parking is 135 stalls, which will reguire a relaxation from current requirements.



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The meeting addressed many concerns in the community - construction, parking, traffic and whether this would become a very large low-income housing development. The developer was very clear in his business plan that it is not, and is putting up a high-quality building with amenities that will cater to upper-year students at both SAIT and U of C.

The Developer took questions from members of the community, which are included in the complete version of the Motel Village update posted on the Hounsfield Heights-Briar Hill website (hh-bh.ca). We will continue to post updates on the site as information becomes available.

Learning Through Life

It's soon back to school time. Getting an education and going to school is something most of us think ends the day we graduate from high school, college or university in our younger years. You will not have to make payments on your Canada Apprentice Loan, and no interest will accumulate until after you complete or leave your apprenticeship training program.

The Apprenticeship Incentive Grant is a taxable cash grant of \$1,000 per year or per level, up to a maximum amount of \$2,000 per person. The Apprenticeship Completion Grant is a one-time taxable cash grant of \$2,000 for registered apprentices who complete their apprenticeship training and obtain their journeyperson certification. If you are an eligible apprentice, you can also receive up to 55 percent of your weekly average insurable earnings in El benefits while attending full-time technical training.

Those hiring an apprentice could be eligible for the Apprenticeship Job Creation Tax Credit (AJCTC) which is a non-refundable tax credit equal to 10% of the eligible salaries and wages payable to eligible apprentices. The maximum credit an employer can claim is \$2,000 per year for each eligible apprentice.

Interesting fact: the average resident of a walkable neighborhood weighs 6-10 pounds less than someone who lives in a sprawling neighborhood. So, what makes a neighborhood walkable?

- A centre: whether it's a main street or a public
- People: Enough people for businesses to flourish and for public transit to run frequently.
- · Mixed income, mixed use: Affordable housing located near businesses.
- Parks and public space: Plenty of public places to gather and play.

- Pedestrian design: Buildings are close to the street; parking lots are relegated to the back.
- Schools and workplaces: Close enough that most residents can walk from their homes.
- · Complete streets: Streets designed for bicyclists, pedestrians, and transit.

Downtown Economic Summit

The downtown has long been Calgary's economic engine. Across the city, businesses and households depend on the success of our downtown. When the economy of our downtown falters, the financial impacts are felt throughout Calgary.

Until recently, the centre city generated 40% of Calgary's non-residential tax revenue and 25% of city-wide employment. Today, nearly 30% of downtown office space sits empty, and the situation is expected to worsen when construction wraps up on several new office towers.

Between 2016 and 2018, it is estimated that \$7.5 billion in the assessed value of downtown office space will be wiped out. The dramatic change in the downtown economy has knock-on impacts to all Calgarians, not only in a transfer of taxes to businesses outside the core, but also a steep reduction in transit and parking revenues.

To help mitigate the tax shift, Council supported \$45 million in one-time city-wide tax relief for businesses and set a 0% residential property tax increase in 2017. While these are important measures to provide shortterm assistance, we need long-term solutions to address the root cause of Calgary's challenges – a struggling downtown economy.

Councillor Woolley and I, with guidance from Calgary Economic Development, initiated a Downtown Economic Summit in early 2017. The Summit brought together some of the most creative problem-solvers in Calgary to generate ideas for a more resilient, resourceful, and diversified downtown. We learned from the experiences of other cities, like Denver and Pittsburgh, on ways to recover from structural recessions.

Calgary Economic Development presented the outcomes of the Summit to Council in June, with information on current economic and real estate challenges, as well as ways to move forward. They showed how the global economy is fundamentally shifting, which has a major impact on the downtown's reliance on a single industry.

The report recommended ways to attract new industries and businesses, promote more residential density in the core, encourage post-secondary institutions to locate downtown, and improve infrastructure to attract private investment.

To help bring these recommendations to life, Council approved \$10 million as a pilot from The City's reserves to create the Downtown Economic Investment Fund. This money will help The City respond quickly to innovative ideas, encourage and leverage private investment through strategic partnerships, invest in infrastructure, and work toward revitalising our core.

Not all is doom and gloom! The Conference Board of Canada estimates that Calgary's economy will grow by 2.3% in 2017, with 19,000 new jobs added by 2018. This is encouraging and means The City's investment can go even further to help improve our economy and get Calgarians back to work.




