## **Construction Starts on Child and Adolescent Mental Health Centre**

A new Centre for Child and Adolescent Mental Health is one step closer to reality with November's official ground-breaking ceremony in Hounsfield Heights at 1015-17A Street NW, immediately north of the old AA-DAC facility.

Being built in partnership between Alberta Health Services (AHS) and the Alberta Children's Hospital Foundation, the centre will provide young people with new and enhanced services, including a walk-in clinic with specialized triage and the opportunity for immediate referrals to onsite programs. These community-based services will provide youth and their families with care designed to stabilize and manage escalating illness and, ideally, prevent hospitalization.

The centre is expected to open in the fall of 2021. In addition to the walk-in clinic, the three-storey, 3,200-sq.-m facility will also offer an intensive treatment program and a day hospital. The facility's services will augment and integrate with existing services provided by AHS and community-based agencies.

"We want to make the centre as comfortable as possible for the kids and families who will need it," says Naomi Pearce, a member of the Centre's Youth Advisory Council. "We hope knowing it was made just for them will encourage kids to go for help as soon as they start to struggle – before things get critical."

The HHBH Community Association worked with representatives from AHS to ensure that information was provided to local residents regarding the project, and that there were opportunities to provide input. Members from the Community Association will continue to engage with AHS through the construction phase of the project. In addition, the Community Association is looking for ideas from local residents regarding the use of a green space area north of the facility, which has been fenced off for many years, and will be released back to the public realm once construction is complete. Further details on this greenspace and ideas on potential uses will be provided in future issues of the Beacon.



## **Rezoning Application for 1922 & 1924 10 Ave NW into 4 Single Dwellings**

An application has been submitted to the City to redesignate 1922 & 1924 10 Ave NW from R-C1 to R-C1N. The parcel historically known as 1924 10 Ave NW held a single bungalow. That bungalow has been demolished, the parcel divided into west and east halves (thereby creating 1922) and the applicant is now seeking a rezoning to redevelop the 2 parcels into 4 separate parcels, each with a new single detached dwelling. The result will be 4 separate homes where there was formerly one bungalow.

The HHBH Community Association hosted a community meeting on Tuesda, November 26, 2019, regarding this application, and 87 people from the community attended. The HHBH Community Association believes the rezoning application to be significant. Placing four detached buildings on a lot that previously held one bungalow will

1) significantly affect traffic flow and on-street parking on 19th Street and 10th Avenue, particularly if the proposed tandem parking (one behind the other) for each of the four buildings is not used as intended; and

2) the laneless lot will result in more traffic and waste / recycling activity at a significant intersection of 19th Street / 10th Avenue where vehicles are already struggling to get up the hill on an icy, snowy day, thus increasing pedestrian, cyclist, and vehicular risk.

The proposed redevelopment is significantly different from what presently exists along 10th Avenue, and does not meet numerous longstanding community standards pertaining to redevelopment, including lot width, lot coverage, lot size, green space and minimum setbacks.

The HHBH Community Association does not typically take an active role on city land use applications, but given the concerns raised by community members regarding this development, as well as the potential for this development to set a precedent in the Community, the Community Association expects to be taking an active role as this application moves through the City's application process. ## SEEING GREEN



Happy New Year! As 2020 begins, we take time to look back at our accomplishments during the past year. It was a year with setbacks for many Albertans, but I remain hopeful that we can improve our society by supporting one another.

I was glad to join over a dozen teachers plus community members for my constituency office's Teachers' Canvass event in late November. Our Mountain View neighbours were enthusiastic about sharing their stories and adding their names to our petition to support public education. I look forward to more MLA outreach events planned for this coming year.

Recent layoffs and cuts to services by Premier Jason Kenney and his government have made it more difficult for students, teachers, and staff in schools and universities to access programs, and is continuing to affect these workplaces and learning institutions. As always, I'll keep fighting alongside my NDP Caucus colleagues for highquality public education, available to all Albertans.

Public healthcare also faces enormous challenges under Premier Kenney, with thousands of nurses and other health professionals expected to be laid off this spring. Public sector unions and advocacy groups have been rallying to oppose these decisions, and while it's an ongoing struggle, it is encouraging to see so many people coming together to fight these cuts.

I'm proud that my colleague Janis Irwin, MLA for Edmonton-Highlands-Norwood, led tireless efforts to stop Bill 207. This Bill ostensibly protects "Conscience Rights" but is widely seen to have discriminatory ramifications. Thankfully, it was voted down in committee during the Fall Sitting of the Alberta Legislature as Irwin's commitment continues to inspire many across the province.

Council recently learned that slower than expected development in Calgary's new communities is expected to cause an additional \$56.9 million shortfall. This is bad news for Calgarians, who can expect tax increases, utility rate increases, and/or service cuts to cover the shortfall.

Here are the highlights:

- Council approved 14 new communities on Calgary's edges
- This was in addition to 27 developing communities
- Council committed \$537 million to these 41 communities
- Housing demand is declining because of the economy
- We have more land than required to meet demand, so new communities will be built slower
- The City must pay to service new communities. Levies collected from development are then supposed to cover the costs to the City as the communities build out
- Slower build out means slower return to the City
- This causes the \$56.9m shortfall

Calgary is expanding unsustainably. We must provide services over a larger area, at the same time as we are cutting police, fire, transit, and other City services because of the Downtown tax shift and provincial budget. It is a classic example of less butter spread over more bread.

This is frustrating because it was predictable. When Council approved the 14 new communities, I recognized we were providing more supply than market demand could meet. I voted against approving all 14 because I knew this decision would result in financial challenges. Unfortunately, the 14 new communities passed 12-2.

On top of all this, the development industry is pushing for even more communities. As our economy continues to struggle, we should be doing more to maximize the use of existing infrastructure, instead of adding new neighbourhoods on Calgary's edge that aren't paying for themselves, and then cutting services in existing communities.

Growth must pay for growth. That is currently not happening in Calgary. Council needs to make smarter growth decisions in the future.
