We Are Re-opening October 1, 2020!

Finally, this is Halloween Month, so be safe, dress to be seen, and have fun!



The Future of 16 Avenue N.W. We want to hear from you.

The City of Calgary is conducting a study to determine the future transportation vision for 16 Avenue NW between Crowchild Trail and Sarcee Trail as well as the Main Street Streetscape Plan for Montgomery between Home Road to 43 Street NW.

Over the past year, we have worked with communities to identify and understand what's important to Calgarians and generate ideas for possible changes to the study area. In Phase 1: Discovery, we invited Calgarians to join us at an open house and participate in an online survey to garner feedback on opportunities, challenges, priorities, and success criteria to consider when developing preliminary concepts. We collated all the feedback we received, conducted a technical review, and developed preliminary concepts that best met the study's objectives and what we heard from Calgarians.

This October, as part of Phase 2: Explore, we are asking Calgarians to evaluate the preliminary concepts against the study's objectives in Phase 1. We will then use the evaluation, along with additional technical review, to identify a set of recommendations for Calgarians to provide feedback on in Phase 3: Reveal in Spring 2021.

YOUR CITY OF CALGARY

Starting October 1, remember to tag your extra garbage bags

Starting October 1, if you have an extra bag of garbage that won't fit in your City black cart, you'll need to buy a garbage tag. Tags are \$3 each and available at participating convenience and grocery stores or online. See the full list at calgary.ca/garbagetag.

How to use garbage tags:

- 1. Fill your black cart first.
- Place extra garbage in a bag and wrap a tag around the knot on top of the bag.
- On collection day, set the bag 0.5 metres (2 feet) from your black cart.
 We encourage everyone to look at

what you are buying and throwing away to find ways to reduce waste. Sorting materials correctly helps maximize the use of all three carts (blue, green, black).

Acknowledgement: On behalf of the HH/BH Safety Portfolio and the other HH/BH Directors, thank you to all residents who are getting involved in continuing to ensure our community is a desirable and safe place to live.

Transparency: On September 2, the Safety Portfolio sent an email to Councillor Farrell outlining, to date, the actions that have been taken by the Safety Portfolio. In addition, we proposed a meeting be arranged with Councillor Farrell and others, such as CPS, to discuss to growing concerns regarding safety and crime in our neighbourhood. Included below are key elements of the letter.

Hello Councillor Farrell

To date, since taking on the role of the Safety Director as of Oct. 2019, I have researched the following:

- Bylaws and Public Safety
- Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)
- Community Standards and our Neighborhood Partnership Coordinator's role
- Calgary Police Services. Crime statistics, SCAN, Non-urgent police process, Enmax "Light up the night" program and doorbell video security systems
- Alpha House, Drop In Center and other social services. This includes volunteering at Inn from the Cold Family Shelter
- Transit Watch and the Peace Officers' role
- Community Response Safety Program
- Alberta Community Prevention Associations and Community Based Policing Models.
- Crime and COVID.

In addition to educating myself and informing the HH/BH

residents, these are the course of actions taken thus far:

- Submitting a monthly article informing what residents can do to empower themselves when it comes to their safety such as the 9PM Routine Checklist or how to report crimes/social disorders during these changing times
- 2. Attended District 3 Calgary Police Services Town Hall in November 2019
- 3. Scheduled meetings with Neighborhood Partnership Coordinator
- 4. Submitted a grant proposal to Community Standards Fund
- Participated in a "ride along" with Calgary Police Services Zone 3 Constable
- 6. Developed and launched Safety Portfolio at AGM in Nov. 2019
- Informed residents about platforms such as NextDoor and WhatsUp app.

Also, there is a second Safety Director who has worked in other areas of the Safety Portfolio. However, even with all the combined effort and time invested by the Safety Directors, the HH/ BH community needs your help in obtaining the resources required to tackle the current state of safety within our community.

The HH/BH President, Terry Wong and the Directors of the Safety Portfolio would like to set up a meeting with Councillor Farrell, CPS, Calgary Public Library and City Bylaws, Parks, Roads, and Transit LRT to establish a coordinated response.

Thank you for your time and I look forward to your response."

The purpose of sharing some of the contents of this letter is to let the HH/BH residents know that your volunteer Community Association Board Directors are listening.

Perhaps, as frustrating as some of these processes are, we can't forget that there are many moving parts when it comes to managing issues like community safety and crime. And complex as it may be, the HH/BH Board of Directors are attempting to find solutions and believe every action, no matter how small or insignificant it may seem, does make a difference. Once again, thank you for talking to your neighbours, for walking your dogs, biking on the pathways, and sharing relevant information on social media.

During a Parks and Recreation Study, an interim report in May 1968 set aside City-owned land designated as Public Land for Park Purposes on Nose Hill. It was "not likely" to be the total extent of the Park. The agreement anticipated major roadways and City waterworks. City Council proposed Nose Hill, Bowness Flats, Glenmore, and Fish Creek. (Fish Creek is now a provincial park).

When the 1980 Nose Hill Park Master Plan was approved, the City owned about one half of the proposed park area. By 1990, the remaining lands were assembled. The public preferred natural and cultural resource values. The uniqueness of the park must be preserved and perpetuate the natural character of the landscape. Although public use increased, Nose Hill is managed as a natural area, with compatible, low-impact recreation.

The Responsible Pet Owners Bylaw is under review. The October 2020 - Phase 2 What We Heard Report will be posted on https://engage.calgary.ca/petbylaw, with comments from the public, stakeholders, and City staff. There are phone surveys and focus groups for Bylaw updates to the Council Committee on Community and Protective Services and to City Council by January-March 2021.

Did you know that Canada has 450 bird species? Yet, grassland birds, aerial insectivores, and shorebirds have all experienced alarming population declines—and many more remain at-risk. We can create bird-friendly cities and reduce bird mortality rates in urban centres. National Wildlife Areas or Migratory Bird Sanctuaries may help Canada meet its protected area targets.

We should have international relationships and set higher standards for protecting the connective habitat on which migratory birds rely. Their diverse habitats have been heavily degraded due to human activity and their populations face rapid decline. More information on Birds Connect Our World at www.naturecanada.ca.
