Community Clean Up is a Great Opportunity to:

Dispose of large items: The City of Calgary Waste & Recycling Services sponsors a unique community program by providing two packer trucks. Residents can bring unwanted household goods and yard waste (things that might otherwise fill your basement, yard, street or alley) to the pick-up site.

Recycle: We will also have electronic recycling, scrap metal, & car battery recycling.

Exchange: There will be a 'Give and Take' section where you can leave or take anything that may still be of some use. (We can only take items in the 'Give and Take' until 1:00 – please no dealers this is a community service only).

Clean: Our green spaces – there will be teams of volunteers tidying up as many local green spaces as we can get to. We're on the look-out for a Green Space Clean-Up Coordinator, so if you could help organize this aspect, please contact Phil or Cindy Johnson at 403-284-4977

Donate: Women In Need Society will be collecting women's, men's & children's clothing (clean & in good condition); housewares; small furniture (no couches or large chairs)

A Message from Alderman Druh Farrell



Welcome news for homeowners in communities with aging infrastructure!

In March, City Council voted to change the local improvement bylaw, ending the previous 50% cost-sharing policy for sidewalk replacement work. From now on, when The City

identifies a portion of sidewalk, curb, or gutter for replacement, adjacent residents will not be charged for the work.

It has long been an area of contention that a homeowner must pay for what is considered normal lifecycle maintenance. Historically, The City shared the cost with adjacent residents who benefited from the renewed infrastructure. Residents had the option to pay an upfront one-time payment or an annual amount that was included in their property tax bill for up to 15 years. Residents who objected to the local improvement were required to petition their neighbours for a two-thirds majority.

The new policy applies to projects initiated by The City from the 2012 local improvement bylaws onward. The local improvement cost-sharing rules still apply when residents request their own local improvements for concrete repairs and replacement.

Rather than requiring a tax increase to pay for this program, Council was able to find funding by allocating \$1.4 million from tax room identified during November's budget discussions. Calgarians can still expect reliable infrastructure to be installed and maintained in their communities, while not having to bear the previously required 50% cost.

City of Calgary Parks Update

Last year, The City of Calgary Parks began work on park improvements in our neighbourhood as part of the Established Communities Open Space Upgrades project. These improvements are part of a three-year initiative (2012 to 2014) designed to improve and enhance existing green spaces within Calgary's older, established neighbourhoods.

Remaining park improvements for 2013 include the installation of picnic tables at the 14 Street park site and construction of the asphalt pathway along the top of the ridge at the Bethany Slopes park site will be completed this year. All work will be completed according to the approved plans discussed with your Community Association.

A construction start-up date is currently not available, as work depends on a number of factors such as weather, ground conditions, and contractor schedule. However, Parks will provide updates when information becomes available. All work is targeted for completion by fall 2013.

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Michelle Rempel, MP Calgary Centre-North Report to Constituents

I was very pleased to host a Telephone Town Hall for all the constituents in the riding on April 23. This was the first time I've held a telephone town hall in our riding and it was very successful with almost 9000 participants over the hour long event. Participants had

the opportunity to ask questions and respond to polls on a variety of Government policies. It was wonderful to have so much feedback from those who participated. As always, your views are important to me.

Also in April, I held a Community Round Table with a focus on immigration issues. I was delighted to welcome M.P. Rick Dykstra, the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Citizenship and Immigration, to Calgary from his riding in St. Catharines, Ontario. His outstanding expertise was invaluable, and provided a good insight for community leaders. I thought that this was a very successful interaction with a large amount of useful feedback and comments. I would like to thank all of the participants in this valuable exercise and commend them for their activities in the community.

In my last newsletter, I wrote to you about a study on Urban Conservation Practices in Canada. I led in my capacity as Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of the Environment, on the House of Commons Standing

Committee on the Environment and Sustainable Development. I also asked you for your views on the subject, and I want to thank all of you for the overwhelming number of thoughtful and insightful responses my office received. These were truly helpful to our committee as we finalized our report on the subject.

With the conclusion of one study comes the beginning of another, and to continue our committee's commitment to the development of the Government's National Conservation Plan, we recently began a new study on Habitat Conservation in Canada. Aside from learning how the Federal Government can work to improve upon its current habitat conservation efforts, our committee also hopes to expose some of the excellent work done by locally-based conservation groups, aboriginals, landowners, hunters and larger conservation organizations in protecting Canada's biodiversity and ecosystems. These groups and organizations are truly the unsung heroes in the overall protection of Canada's natural environment, and it is important that our Government learns how to leverage their local knowledge and expertise in its efforts.

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

Club will be on hand to introduce the game to those who want to try it out and to help get the program up and running. More details to follow on the HHBH website and the October issue of the Beacon.



The P.U.P.P.Y. Program: Help make our parks #1 by picking up #2!

Did you know that pet waste left in yards and parks is washed into storm drains and is the leading contributor to storm water contamination? In fact, pet waste is classified as a dangerous pollutant and is in the same category as toxic chemicals and oil!

The P.U.P.P.Y. (Pick Up Pooch's Poo Yourself) program, a partnership with The City of Calgary Parks and The City of Calgary Animal & Bylaw Services, was established in 2011 to educate Calgarians about the importance of picking up and disposing of pet waste and to make participants familiar with responsible pet ownership and sustainable park use. This program encourages Calgarians to participate in P.U.P.P.Y. events that focus on park stewardship to keep our off-leash areas safe and healthy for pets, people and wildlife. Experts will be on-hand to share information on a variety of pet-related topics; volunteers will lead engaging, interpretive programs; and supplies will be available for community residents to "pitch in and pick up" waste.



What can you do to keep off-leash areas safe and clean?

- Always have pet waste baggies with you when you walk your dog. Pick up your pet's waste and dispose of the bag properly in a waste receptacle.
- Model responsible behaviours and encourage other park users to pick up their pet's waste.
- Participate in the P.U.P.P.Y. program events to learn about sustainable park use and responsible pet ownership.
- Organize a community cleanup in your favourite off-leash area or park by registering for a green project.

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Emergency
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Backyard Play Safety

With summer fast approaching, Alberta Health Services EMS would like to encourage parents to ensure their backyard play areas are made safe. Direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury. It is also prudent to ensure play equipment in your yard is suitable for the age and skill of the children using it. Don't forget to check the equipment often and repair any worn or broken parts. Set up play equipment on 8 to 12 inches of a shock-absorbing surface such as sand, wood chips, or pea gravel. Grass will not adequately cushion a fall.

Water hazards

- Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence should be at least 1.5 metres (5 feet) high and have a self-latching, self-closing, lockable gate;
- Drowning is the leading cause of unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to four;
- Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose.

Lawn and garden tools

- Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment. Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces;
- Ensure that all tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

Insect bites and stings

- Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions;
- Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors;
- Destroy or re-locate hives and nests situated near your home;
- To avoid a bite in case of accidentally stepping on a stinging insect always ensure you child wears shoes or sandals;
- If your child has received an 'EpiPen Jr' prescription from your physician (for serious anaphylactic emergencies only) ensure they understand when and how to use it;
- If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, seek medical attention or call 9-1-1.
